#### **Episcopal Family Fun Bowling Day**



When I was a little girl, I wanted to be a missionary. Not a firefighter, teacher, policeman, or nurse, like most children. A missionary. My friends always laughed at me. My parents discouraged me because their understanding of a missionary was as someone who went off to a Third World country to tell people to follow Jesus. I grew up and instead became a journalist, then a communications professional, then a Fortune 500 executive, then a non-profit executive, then a Christian education director, and then, finally, a priest. Not a missionary in the traditional sense of being sent to a foreign country on behalf of a Christian group, but a missionary in the sense of being on a mission to spread the love of Jesus.

My spiritual director has a saying that sometimes it takes us a long time to catch up with ourselves. Sometimes, God calls us to do something, and we put off doing it.

Putting off doing what God calls us to do may not be ideal. But, as long as we stay open to God working in our lives, we do eventually catch up to ourselves. And God finds a way to use all our experiences along the journey to form us.

A worse situation occurs when we decide we're already doing what God wants us to do and so decide we don't need to be open to change. So, God may be calling us to transform a part of our lives, but we're so sure we're already righteous that we don't hear God. When that happens, we become like the chief priests who were so engrained in their own righteousness that they failed to recognize Jesus for Who He Was. And they also failed to change their lives to follow Jesus.

God gives us free will and won't beat us over the head with a call to change. Sometimes, the call comes in subtle ways. We need to be open to God's call in these ways. For example, new people may come into our church with different ideas. Their new ideas may well come from the Holy Spirit. Indeed, the newest converts to Christianity are often the most Spirit-filled. But because their ideas differ from those we're comfortable with, we reject them. We fail to keep our hearts open to being transformed and finding new ways of reaching out to the community or worshipping God.

Likewise, generations differ. Although the Gospel is unchanging, the ways we must make the Gospel accessible to new generations do change. The absence or underrepresentation of some ages in our church community may be God's call to us to try something new. The lack of new members joining our community may also indicate that God is calling us to a new thing.

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Sometimes, we sense God's call in restlessness. We've been doing something we used to love, yet we yearn for something else. If we remain open and prayerful, we may discover that restlessness was the Holy Spirit stirring up our hearts.

We may also sense God's call when something unexpected happens. God sometimes causes unexpected things, but more often, God works through them. For example, I don't believe God ever causes bad things to happen to us. But God often works through the bad things to call us to change our lives. For example, consider Eunice Kennedy, who started the Special Olympics after watching how society treated children with intellectual disabilities like her sister Rosemary. Or Candace Lightner, who founded Mothers Against Drunk Driving after a drunk driver killed her 13-year-old daughter. These women could have allowed these tragedies to turn them away from God. Instead, they were open to hearing God's call and allowing it to transform them into something new and to try to change the world.

Sometimes, adults are like children. When their mom asks her children to pick up their shoes from the floor, they keep doing whatever they are doing and say, "in a minute" several times until finally, they run out of minutes and have to do what their parent asked them to. But, at least the child finally picks up the shoes. Even though the child kept playing, they still listened to their parent. They were still open to answering the call. It's far better that we be that child instead of the one who never picks up the shoes, even after their grandmother trips over them and falls.

As long as we stay alert and open to where God is calling us and as long as we realize we need to continually be open to transformation, we remain in good fellowship with God. We avoid becoming Pharaiseeical in our lives.

As long as we are open to the Holy Spirit – even if it shows up in unusual places – we will eventually catch up with ourselves. We'll be the change God wants in the world.

Some years ago, I worked as a counselor at a day camp for children who were infected or affected by HIV/AIDs. Either the child had HIV, or a sibling, or the parent.

I had 11-year-old girls in my group, and they enjoyed various very active pursuits. Most of the week, the day camp occurred on the extensive grounds of one urban Episcopal church. One day during the week, we took a bus to the diocesan's camp on the James River. It was a vast amount of land with kayaking, ropes courses, hiking, and other activities that the church grounds did not offer. It was the highlight of the camp week. The challenge (and the reason we didn't have a camp there every day) was the water. The water in the river and all the water fountains throughout the camp was less than pure. It was good enough that most of us could drink it and feel refreshed without negative consequences. However, for those with compromised immune systems, like most of our children, drinking this water that contained a little bacteria could be fatal. The task of the camp facility's staff was to bring bottled water near each place where we had activities.

The camp was held in August in Virginia. Virginia is very hot and humid in August, especially in low-lying areas near the river. My group and I had a wonderful time hiking for about two hours, and when we got back to our starting point, the only water we found was the camp's water fountain. I felt like I was about to die of thirst, having run behind these 11-year-olds for the whole hike. (Yes, these kids had a lot of energy despite their challenges.) But I knew I couldn't drink from the fountain because it would set a poor example for my kids, who couldn't drink from it safely. Our bottled water, which would have been safe, was late arriving. All of us were longing for that water. The journey of that hike had exhausted us and depleted our energy. We struggled for the five minutes we had to wait for it to arrive.

Water is critical to our lives. It quenches our thirst and rejuvenates us. It irrigates vegetation. It keeps us clean. Likewise, living springs of water are essential to our faith. We encounter living water in Baptism. We encounter the water mixed with wine in the Eucharist. The water in Baptism and the Eucharist are outward signs of the living water God places within us as children of God. They also foreshadow the streams of living waters we will encounter when our time on earth is over. They tell us about the refreshing water our loved ones who have gone before us now drink from.

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When we are beaten down and broken by being part of the world around us, the living water that Jesus brings renews us. Jesus's water is pure and clear. It blesses us as we struggle to walk faithfully in this broken world. It comforts us. As we work to bring peace to a violent world, Jesus leads us to places of refreshment and comfort. As we grieve for those people or things we've lost, Jesus leads us to places of comfort. When we realize how much our souls need God, Jesus takes us there. When we cry out because of injustices we see in the world, Jesus helps renew our spirits. When others turn against us because we stand firmly for what is right, Jesus is there for us.

We are all broken, and we exist in a broken world. But God blesses us as we try to live good lives – saintly lives – in this broken world. God comforts us as we wait for God in silence. God comforts us through the sacraments. God comforts us through our time together in community. God has always existed to bring comfort to humankind. God comforted our ancestors, refreshing them while they struggled to live godly lives amid a broken world. No matter what, God is here for us. We can access that living water of God through prayer, participation in the sacraments, and the encouragement of each other. Indeed, as we gather around the Eucharistic table, we join with God, each other who are physically present, and the Spirits of all those who have ever gathered around this Table and now gather for a similar feast face to face with Jesus.

God also comforts us as we realize that our ministry in this broken world isn't all there is. Almost all of us have experienced times of grief or loss and times of frustration in trying to live as holy people in an unjust and unholy world. Another way God comforts us is to remind us that the world to come offers us eternal bliss. At the end of our time on earth, we'll drink continually from the refreshing springs of cool, clear water. We will join those in white robes who now see God face to face.
