Thoughts on Stewardship

"Flowers appear on the earth; the season of singing has come, the cooing of doves is heard in our land."

Song of Songs 2:12

- 5) Stops installed on elevator doors to prevent damage to walls
- 6) Men's room and hall heat registers repainted

- 8) Bushes need to be evaluated for cut back or replacement (north side of walk at front door)
- 9) Get estimates to spray for flies

Youth Recognition Sunday, May 22, 2016

Sermon by Chad Gilson

You know, I never thought this would ever be me. I've been going to St. Andrews my whole life and have seen the sermon/speech done countless times by graduating seniors, but it's still surreal that it's me standing here talking to you. Going here and growing up in this congregation has truly been a blessing. You have had a bigger impact on my life than most of you can imagine. Well, besides Mrs. Depew, she probably knows more about me than my own mom, so she knows her importance. You guys have helped mold the little kid that used to run to around the church and scream and cry and probably annoy you, into the bigger but equally still annoying man I am now. Now many of you are probably wondering, "What the heck did this kid learn from me, I've never even spoken to him." or "Really, he actually learned something?" And yes I have. You, the congregation at St. Andrew's have taught me three things that I will carry with me throughout my life, and that is the Importance of Faith, to love each other with a full heart, and Family.

Faith: Faith is defined as the complete confidence or trust in someone or something. This may seem like a simple concept to grasp but let's put into perspective how hard it is to put complete trust into someone. Let's say that we are both in school. The teacher says only 1 person can take the test and that whatever that person got on the test the rest of class got the same grade. Now the teacher tells you it's a Physics test and I have to take a test. Now keep in mind I got a 55 on my last Physics test. Would you put your complete trust in me? Or would it be hard to? Of course it would. Now let's compare that to our faith in God. Something bad happens in your life. Sickness, death, devastation, whatever it may be, but something goes wrong. Now the easy thing to do would be to abandon your faith in God and say he isn't real or he doesn't care, however, you, as the congregation have showed and told me countless times that this is never the case, and that God has a plan for each one of us including myself and that if I put my faith in him, that all will be okay.


Loving each other with a full heart: This is a funny one because this is something I actually learned while doing "the peace" growing up. This short 5 minutes of what I called "break time" when I was younger taught me one of the biggest lessons of my life. Seeing all the members of the congregation stand up mingle around and shake hands or hug

as many people as humanly possible in that little amount of time is truly incredible. It showed me how really easy it is to accept each other's differences and show love to one another no matter the circumstances.

Family can be described by the dictionary as all the decedents of a common ancestor, however, I think a better description of what family is, a group of people that love and care about each other as a whole more than themselves and that is exactly what this congregation does with one another. You, the congregation have showed me why it is important to love one another like a family, and I think there is no better example of the importance of that than what we as a church are going through now. When Judith first said that she was leaving, there are many parishes that would of went into chaos or lost their way slightly in losing a very influential and long tenured pastor. However, because our congregation acted as a family we stood strong, and are handling this "transition period" as well and efficiently as possible. Another example in which the congregation taught me it was important to be like family is when Deacon Rocky announced that he was retiring, now for sure losing both our pastor and Deacon within a few months would ruin our psyche as a congregation. But no, we stood strong and supported Deacon Rocky in his decision because that's what families do; to support each other and put others needs in the family before their own. And lastly, I think the best example of how the congregation showed me how to be a family is at Fish Fry. It showed me how well members of this congregation work together and put their free time on hold, to put together something very special.

Before I go on to my next journey in life, away from Newfane, I just want say thank you to all of you in supporting me in all I've done growing up in this congregation. You have all had impact on my life, and no matter the size of that impact, it is something that I am truly blessed for. I know this isn't a Grammy speech but I would feel bad if I didn't say thank you to my parents and my Aunt for instilling in me the importance of faith and making me go to church, even on the days where I would have much rather stayed in bed and slept. And to my Sunday school teachers for reinstalling in me the importance of faith and teaching me about the word of God; for that is something I will carry with me throughout my life, wherever I may be.

And lastly thank you again to the congregation, for all you have done. It is truly something I will never forget.



Health Ministry

Ahhh Summer!

What a wonderful thought for most of us. Unfortunately for some, it is a time of itching, stuffed noses, watery eyes and just general discomfort. People are allergic to many things such as pollen, dust mites, animal dander, mold, foods, and drugs.

Many people also have Hay Fever (pollen allergy), made by trees, grasses, and weeds. Symptoms of hay fever include sneezing, runny or clogged nose, coughing, itchy eyes, nose, and throat, watery eyes, and red swollen eyes. Your doctor may order skin tests using a needle to put a small amount of allergen in your skin. The reaction i.e. redness, itching, stinging, tells the doctor if you have allergies. Blood tests may be ordered to show a protein in your blood. The protein IgE is made by your body if you have allergies.

Treatments: Avoid things that cause symptoms, use medications, get allergy shots.

Other suggestions during summer activities:

- Protect skin from the sun
- Always keep the pool safe from children who are unsupervised
- Be familiar with CPR


